Synopsis

ACT I

The Palace

Dido, the queen of Carthage, had determined to never remarry after the death of her husband. She is now tormented by her attraction to their Trojan guest, Aeneas. Belinda, her sister and attendant urges that uniting their two kingdoms would benefit both. Aeneas arrives and convinces Dido of his love, and she accepts him.

ACT II

Scene 1 - The Sorceress' Cave

A sorceress and her witches plot the downfall of Dido. They will conjure a storm and then send an elf, disguised as Mercury, to remind Aeneas that the Gods have decreed his duty is to set sail for Italy.

Scene 2 - The Garden

Dido and Aeneas, accompanied by their court, are enjoying a day outdoors with a hunt and feasting. Their festivities are ended by the promised storm, and as all are rushing back to the palace, Aeneas is stopped by the disguised Mercury. Aeneas consents to what he believes are the orders of the Gods, but he is distraught because he must leave Dido.

ACT III

Scene 1 - *The seaside*

At the shore, Aeneas' men are preparing to set sail. The witches gloat over their success.

Scene 2 - *The Palace*

Dido has been informed of her lover's planned departure and furiously dismisses Belinda's attempts to calm her. She confronts Aeneas over his unforgivable betrayal of their love. Though he vows to stay, she orders him away. Knowing she must die at his leaving; she asks that she be remembered well.

***Dido & Aeneas* Background**

Dido and Aeneas is based on Book IV of Virgil's epic *The Aeneid*. It is one of the earliest known English operas, and one of the most important and often performed operas written in the Baroque period. It is also Henry Purcell's only true opera; that is, his only all-sung dramatic work.

What is most remarkable for such an important work in the opera repertoire, is that so little about it is known. A copy of a libretto from the 1700's exists (possibly from the first performance), so we know it originally was composed as a Prologue and Opera. However, the music for the Prologue, the end of the act II Grove scene, and several dances have been lost, and indeed no score exists in Purcell's handwriting.

Moreover, the dates of composition and the first performance are uncertain. It is known, through references in letters, that it was performed at a girls' school in Chelsea, London, some time before the end of 1689. However, some scholars argue that the opera was composed and performed for the Royal Court of either James II or Charles II with a date as early as 1684 and argue that the reference in the Prologue to the joy of a marriage between two monarchs is an allegorical one.

Meet the Artists

Rima Abram is a junior pursuing a double degree in Violin Performance and Neuroscience on the pre-med track. She has been studying violin under Dr. Misha Galaganov. Rima is from Coppell, Texas, a homeschooler who began her violin studies at the age of three. She has played with the Greater Dallas and Fort Worth Youth Orchestras since her elementary years, and she served as assistant concertmaster of the Fort Worth Youth Orchestra. Rima is currently a member of the TCU Symphony Orchestra under the baton of Dr. German Gutierrez. She enjoys performing chamber music, working with student composers, and playing at local senior centers. Rima is honored to be a part of this program and hopes you enjoy the performance.

Faith Adams (soprano) is a senior Vocal Performance major at TCU studying under the esteemed Angela Turner Wilson. She is ecstatic to unleash her inner dark side as First Witch in Purcell's *Dido and Aeneas*! Additionally, this season, Ms. Adams will make her Mozart debut as Pamina in *Die Zauberflöte*. Her most notable TCU Opera credits include Pernille in *The Beautiful Bridegroom*, La Modista in *The Italian Straw Hat*, Talkative Ex and Papagena in *Speed Dating Tonight!!*, and Fiordiligi in TCU Opera Scenes. With the Taos Opera Institute, Ms. Adams performed the roles #7 and #10 in *Remove Shoes Before Entering* under composer Michael Ching himself, scenes from *La Traviata*, *La Bohème*, *Die Fledermaus*, *Cavalleria Rusticana*, and *Carousel*, and arias from *The Elixir of Love*, *The Ballad of Baby Doe*, and *Der Freischütz*. Since entering college, she has been named both Texoma NATS Semi-Finalist and Finalist. Ms. Adams is a sought-after soloist with various productions under her belt, but her favorites include TCU's 2020 Festival of American Song with Libby Larsen, Dr. Corey Trahan's *Evolution of Broadway in 90 Minutes* lecture, the National Rodeo at Billy Bob's, and Handel's *Messiah* performances across the metroplex. Aside from her opera pursuits, Ms. Adams has received the title of TCU Scholar and membership on the TCU Dean's List, and she is a Choral Scholar and frequent soloist at St. Stephen Presbyterian Church.

Catherine Anderson is a soprano in her senior year studying vocal music under Professor Angela Turner-Wilson. She also studies business, as well as

film and television, at TCU. Most recently, Catherine starred as Julie in *Speed Dating Tonight!!* with TCU Opera Studio and as Titania in *The Loathly Lady* with The Vienna Summer Music Festival.

Scott Bellen is thrilled (and humbled) to join such a talented cast and chorus for *Dido and Aeneas*. He has performed with SATB and men's choirs and ensembles in a variety of musical styles including a cappella, jazz, madrigal, gospel, and now opera. His theatrical experience includes roles as Kaspar and chorus member in *Amahl and the Night Visitors*, Sir Evelyn Oakleigh in *Anything Goes*, Ambrose Kemper in *Hello Dolly*, men's quartet and chorus in *Best Little Whorehouse in Texas*, and choruses of *My Fair Lady*, *Annie Get Your Gun*, and *Bye, Bye Birdie*. He currently sings in his church choir and enjoys helping to select music for worship services.

Natalie Benefield is a senior Bachelor of Arts in Music student under the instruction of Dr. Juliette Herlin. This is her second semester in Collegium, and she has enjoyed playing Baroque cello since her junior year. In addition to Collegium, Natalie has participated in the Symphony Orchestra and Cello Ensemble since her first year at TCU. During her undergraduate studies, Natalie has performed in masterclasses for cellists such as Dmitri Atapine and Akiva Cahn-Lipman. After graduating, Natalie hopes to obtain an MM in Musicology and continue her study of music history and the cello. In addition to music, Natalie also studies French and is an officer in the TCU French Club. Natalie is grateful to be a part of *Dido and Aeneas* and to get to collaborate with so many wonderful musicians!

Anna Borges is a sophomore vocal performance major under the tutelage of Professor Twyla Robinson. Ms. Borges was involved in two TCU Opera Studio productions in the spring of 2022; she was a part of the ensemble (*Le Modiste*/Friend of Elena) in Nino Rota's *The Italian Straw Hat* and played the role of Dater #33 (UFO) in Michael Ching's *Speed Dating Tonight!* This past summer, Ms. Borges had the privilege of performing the role of Barbarina in *Le Nozze di Figaro*, her Mozart opera debut. Her next stage appearances include Henry Purcell's *Dido and Aeneas* (chorus) and Mozart's *Die Zauberflöte* (First Spirit). Ms. Borges enjoys singing with TCU's flagship choral ensemble, Concert Chorale. She has been featured as a soloist in *Cantiamo*, TCU's treble choir, and as a descantist in University Singers. Along with her voice studies, Ms. Borges is a member of the professional music fraternity Mu Phi Epsilon and works at St. Patrick Cathedral as a choral scholar and section leader.

Aubrey Bosse, who recently appeared as Hansel in *Hansel and Gretel*, is a senior studying vocal performance under Dr. Corey Trahan at Texas Christian University. She most recently performed as Charlotte Rosenstock in the world premiere of Blaise Ferrandino's *A Service of Love* and as both the Waitress and the Hostess in Michael Ching's *Speed Dating Tonight!* Other roles include La Baronessa in Nino Rota's *Il Cappello di Paglia di Firenze*, L'Opinion Publique in Jacques Offenbach's *Orpheus in The*

Underworld, Mrs. Grose in Benjamin Britten's *The Turn of The Screw*, Theodorine in Jacques Offenbach's *The Isle of Tulipatan*, and ensemble member in the world premiere of Evan Mack's *Yeltsin! In Texas*. She has sung at the Utah Vocal Arts Academy Summer Opera Festival and the Taos Opera Institute, two esteemed summer programs. She will sing Second Lady in W. A. Mozart's *Die Zauberflöte* in the spring with the TCU Opera Studio.

Jacob Burk maintains a studio of violinists and violists, frequently performs with various quartets, and is a violist in regional symphonies around Texas. He has also had the opportunity to perform concerts with the Music for Food initiative as well as work with and learn from renowned artists such as Matthew Lipman, The Rolston Quartet, Miguel Harth-Bedoya, Paul Silverthorne. Jacob also volunteers for the Through the Staff organization and teaches students who otherwise could not afford lessons. Recently, Jacob has been hired as faculty for chamber music festivals and has taught masterclasses over orchestral and solo repertoire. Jacob is also a recent Virtu Foundation scholar, performing on a viola from the organization. The viola is of late 19th or early 20th-century French origin bearing a facsimile label of Nestor Audinot dated 1890. Jacob has recently organized fundraising concerts, enjoys discovering music for the viola, and has arranged music for viola.

Kaden Burns is studying music education at TCU and is a section leader at St. Stephen Presbyterian Church. This season, Kaden will be Papageno in Mozart's *Die Zauberflöte* and the Wolf in *Little Red Riding Hood*.

H. Joseph Butler is Professor of Music and University Organist at TCU, where he directs the Collegium Musicum. In 2017 he received the TCU Chancellor's Award for Distinguished Achievement as a Creative Teacher and Scholar. He holds a DMA and Performer's Certificate in organ from the Eastman School of Music, an MM in organ from the New England Conservatory, and a BA from Bowdoin College. Dr. Butler has performed widely in the United States and England, including conventions of the American Guild of Organists and the Historical Keyboard Society of North America, and the cathedrals of Canterbury, Liverpool, Leeds, Ripon, and Chester. He has also performed recitals at Hong Kong Baptist University, the Hong Kong Cultural Centre, the Shanghai Oriental Arts Centre, and the Shenyang Conservatory Concert Hall. He has recorded two CDs on the Pro Organo label. Also active as musicologist, he has published articles in *The New Grove Dictionary of Music and Musicians*, *Organ Yearbook*, *The American Organist*, *The Diapason*, *Bach*, and *Early Keyboard Journal*. His editions of early American keyboard music, published by Wayne Leupold Editions, include *The Peter Pelham Manuscript of 1744: An Early American Keyboard Tutor*, and *The Keyboard Manuscript of Francis Hopkinson*.

Stephen Carey (pianist/vocal coach) is starting his 4th year, as the vocal coach for the TCU Opera Studio. In the 2021-2022 TCU school year, Mr. Carey served as music director, and pianist, for the double-bill of *A Service of Love* (Ferrandino), and *Speed Dating Tonight!* (Ching), music director, and conductor, for *Il cappello di paglia di Firenze* (Rota), and, music director, and pianist, for the double-bill of *The Beautiful Bridegroom* (Dan Shore), and *The Island of Tulipatan* (Offenbach). In the 2020-2021 TCU school year, Mr. Carey served as music director, and pianist, for an online opera scenes program in the fall of 2020, and in the spring 2021 semester, served as music director, and pianist, for 4 one-act operas, consisting of *Remove Shoes Before Entering* (Michael Ching), *The Island of Tulipatan* (Offenbach), *The Beautiful Bridegroom* (Dan Shore), and *The Four Note Opera* (Tom Johnson). In the 2019-2020 TCU school year, Mr. Carey served as music director, conductor, and pianist, for a contemporary opera program, as well as music director, and conductor, for the world premiere of Evan Mack's opera, *Yeltsin In Texas*. In the 2018-2019 school year, Mr. Carey was the assistant music director of the UNT opera program, where he served as vocal coach in productions of Janacek's *Cunning Little Vixen*, and Puccini's *Gianni Schicchi*, and as music director, and conductor, for a concert production of Mozart's *Così fan tutte*. From the fall of 2012, through the spring of 2018, Mr. Carey served as the principal pianist/vocal coach, with Fort Worth Opera. From the fall of 2001, through the spring of 2012, Mr. Carey served as the assistant artistic director, chorus master, and rehearsal pianist/vocal coach for Opera Memphis. Mr. Carey has previously served on the artistic staffs of AIMS in Graz, *Opera In The Ozarks*, *Ashlawn Opera*, *Chautauqua Opera*, and *Utah Festival Opera and Musical Theatre*. This past summer, Mr. Carey spent his second summer with Charlottesville Opera, where he served as music director for the Ader Emerging Artist Program, cover conductor, and chorus master.

Wonjin Choi, Korean Tenor, is in Vocal Performance MM of Texas Christian University with a full scholarship award. He graduated Korea National University of Arts, Bachelor of Music, at the top of Department of Music. He had a successful opera debut, singing Rodolfo in Puccini's opera *La Bohème* at KimSun international opera company, Seoul, South Korea in 2020. He had performed Ernesto in *Don Pasquale*, Ferdinand in *Il Cappello di Paglia di Firenze* and Hermosa in *The Island of Tulipatan* He received encouragement award from The Metropolitan Opera Laffont Minnesota District Competition in 2022. He won lots of competitions. Also, He has received a diploma from Riccardo Muti Academy [*La Traviata*] in 2016. In this season, he looks forward to performing as Governor in Bernstein's operetta *Candide* with The Rapides Symphony Orchestra in Alexandria, Louisiana. He will perform as Tamino from *Die Zauberflöte* by W. A. Mozart, and Sailor from *Dido and Aeneas* by H. Purcell in TCU Opera.

Alicia Cruz is a junior vocal performance major from San Marcos, TX, here at TCU. She has been in several productions here including, *Remove Shoes Before Entering*, *The Italian Straw Hat*, and *Speed Dating*. She is also going to be a part of operas coming up later this semester, as well as

playing the mother in next semester's production of *Little Red Riding Hood*. Alicia has always loved performing, and her passion for music was first realized while growing up singing and playing mariachi music. She was a part of a mariachi band for almost 10 years. She is excited about all the exciting things coming up this year for the opera program and is grateful to be surrounded by a supportive and talented group of peers!

Catherine DiGrazia is a sophomore Vocal Performance major studying under Angela Turner Wilson at TCU. Ms. DiGrazia has performed with TCU Opera Studio in roles including a hat maker in Nino Roti's *Italian Straw Hat* and Dater #14 in Michael Ching's *Speed Dating Tonight*. She has also had the pleasure of performing with the Texas All State Mixed Choir as a first chair Soprano 1 for three consecutive years. She has also been awarded Outstanding Performer for three years in Texas State UIL Solo and Ensemble. In 2021, Mrs. DiGrazia competed and was awarded first place for Texoma NATS in First Year Classical Treble division where she sang Mozart's "Una donna a quindici anni". Most recently, Ms. DiGrazia has sung solos in Janson Gullien and Patrick Vu's recital choirs. After graduating from TCU in May 2025, Ms. DiGrazia plans to attend graduate school with the goal of obtaining her Master's degree in Vocal Performance.

John Dubois is currently a junior vocal performance student at Texas Christian University where he studies with Dr. James Rodriguez.
