Brass Tacks (2024)

R.M. Garmon

In 2000 the Dallas Winds established a tradition of performing brass fanfares 15 minutes prior to curtain in the lobby of the Morton H. Meyerson Symphony Center in Dallas, Texas, for each of its subscription concerts. Our patrons eagerly gather in the lobby to hear these fanfares that have become an important part of the whole concert-going experience.

Brass Tacks was premiered by the Dallas Winds on March 26, 2024 as part of their annual fanfare competition.

Black Horse Troop (1924)

John Philip Sousa (1854-1932)

Sousa's love for horses is reflected in this march dedicated to the mounted troops of a Cleveland National Guard unit. Their exclusive use of black horses was the inspiration for the title. Troop A, once known as the First City Troop of Cleveland, was originally an independent militia group and has had a long, distinguished history since its formation in 1877. Sousa's most noteworthy association with the troop came in 1898. The Sousa Band, having arrived in Cleveland just as the troop was preparing to leave for the Spanish-American War, marched in a parade escorting them from the Armory to the train depot. His first association was much earlier, however. As leader of the U.S. Marine Band in 1881, he marched with the organization in the funeral cortege of President James A. Garfield.

At a dinner held in Sousa's honor in November, 1924, the march was requested by Captain Walker Nye of Troop A. The request was fulfilled promptly, and the march was presented in Cleveland on October 17, 1925, at a Sousa Band concert which also marked the forty-eighth anniversary of Troop A. For the occasion, the mounted troopers were dressed in the blue uniforms of 1877, complete with black fur busbies. Sousa presented a manuscript of the march to Captain Nye. Troop A reciprocated by presenting Sousa with a beautiful bronze statuette entitled "The Last Drop," which depicted a trooper on horseback.

Heart Songs (1997) David Maslanka (1943-2017)

Commissioned by the Harwood Junior High School Band (Bedford, TX.), the title "Heart Songs" comes from the image of watering the tree of life with the blood of the heart. Maslanka wrote that it is his hope "with this music to provide a substantial and deeply-felt piece for young players." The second and third songs are based on melodies from the 371 Chorales by J.S. Bach. Tonight's performance is conducted by Joe Gunn, former director at Harwood Junior HS and the individual behind this piece's commission.

Return (2023)

Haley Woodrow (b. 1984)

During the summer of 2015, I heard an incredible five-sermon series regarding the 2nd coming of Christ. Pastor Jimmy Evans' thought-provoking insights into the future final events of human history inspired me to create this composition. A huge thank-you belongs to my wonderful teacher and friend, Blaise Ferrandino, who I studied with during the initial creative process. I also thank Bobby Francis and the Texas Christian University Wind Symphony, for commissioning it in 2023 as a part of the University's sesquicentennial celebration and funded by the 150th Anniversary Commemoration for Creative Activities. As the great Igor Stravinsky once said, "Music praises God...it is the Church's greatest ornament." My composition aspires to do just this - to praise God through music.

Now concerning the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ.

When the Son of Man comes in his glory, and all the angels with him, then he will sit on his glorious throne.

Before him will be gathered all the nations... (Matthew 25:31-32)

Return begins with musical figures that mimic an ancient shofar calling all nations to gather before the throne. The work culminates as all instruments play Nicaea, the tune from the hymn "Holy, Holy, Holy' in response to the return of Jesus Christ to the Earth.

...and day and night they never cease to say, "Holy, holy, holy, is the Lord God Almighty, who was and is and is to come! (Revelation 4:11)

If you are reading this and have not made up your mind who you believe Jesus Christ is, I encourage you to urgently search for the truth without delay. Nothing is of higher importance.

Luminance (2023)

Shuying Li (b. 1989)

Luminance explores the interplay between light and darkness both musically and thematically. Inspired by the concept of "luminance," this work seeks to evoke a sense of radiance and brilliance through its music.

At its core, Luminance addresses issues relevant to contemporary society. By exploring themes of hope and despair, inclusion and exclusion, and power and powerlessness, the piece seeks to provide a platform for reflection and conversation. Through its use of evocative tonalities and dynamic contrasts, "Luminance" aims to invite audiences to find strength in moments of darkness and embrace the light within themselves.

Luminance was commissioned by a consortium of 42 college bands led by Andy Collinsworth at Sonoma State University and Thomas Seddon at Washburn University.

Traveler (2003)

David Maslanka (1943-2017)

Traveler was commissioned in 2003 by the University of Texas at Arlington Band Alumni Association, the Delta sigma chapter of Kappa Kappa Psi and the Gamma Nu Chapter of Tau Beta Sigma, in honor of the career contributions of Ray C. Lichtenwalter, retiring Director of bands at UT Arlington. Ray has been a close friend and champion of my music for many years, and it was a great pleasure for me to write this piece for his final concert.

The idea for Traveler came from the feeling of a big life movement as I contemplated my friend's retirement. Traveler begins with an assertive statement of the chorale melody "Nicht so traurig, nicth so sehr" ("Not so sad, not so much"). The chorale was not chosen for its title, although in retrospect it seems quite appropriate. The last part of a life need not be sad. It is the accumulation of all that has gone before, and a powerful projection into the future -the potential for a tremendous gift of life and joy. And so the music begins with energy and movement, depicting an engaged life in full stride. At the halfway point, a meditative quiet settles in. Life's battles are largely done; the soul is preparing for its next big step.

Symphony in B-flat (1951)

Paul Hindemith (1895-1963)

Hindemith's Symphony in B-flat for Band was composed during his time in the United States, at the request of Lt. Col. Hugh Curry, leader of the United States Army Band, and was premiered by "Pershing's Own" on April 5, 1951, with Hindemith conducting. Featuring strong melodies, great contrapuntal writing, and complex rhythmic organization, variation, and texture, the Symphony is another true pillar of the repertoire. This masterwork elevated the scope of content available to the concert band, opening the doors for future composers and offering free license to explore the genre, cementing the validity of the wind and percussion ensemble as a medium for serious music.

Joe Gunn is a native of Smackover, Arkansas. He received a Bachelor of Music in Education from Henderson State University in Arkadelphia, Arkansas and Masters of Music from Texas A & M University-Commerce in Commerce, Texas. His public school career includes Conway, Arkansas, L.D. Bell High School, Hurst, Harwood Junior High, Bedford, Trinity High School, Euless, Alvarado ISD. He also worked in the Music Education Department at The University of Texas at Arlington.



Haley Woodrow (b. 1984) is a North Texas based composer, educator, trumpeter and pianist. Her music reflects a broad range of influences and genres, and aims to successfully combine styles as a primary objective.

Haley's Concert Band compositions have received awards and recognition from the American Bandmasters/Sousa/Ostwald composition contest, the National Band Association, the Texas Music Educators Association, and the VLAMO International Composition Contest. Her music has been widely performed throughout the US,

Canada, Europe, Asia, and Australia. Haley has received numerous commissions, including from the Florida Bandmasters Association, the Kenosha Community Foundation, and the Young Band March Project.

Haley currently teaches piano at the King's University and composition at Tarrant County College, where she leads a Chamber Music Composition program and provides practical entrepreneurial training. She holds a Master's of Music in Composition from Texas Christian University, and a Bachelor of Music from the University of Texas at Arlington. Haley and her husband Jonathan have one daughter, Avery, are avid CrossFitters, and attend Gateway Church of Southlake.

Shuying is the founder and artistic director of the contemporary ensemble and non-profit organization Four Corners Ensemble and its annual festival, Operation Opera. About the Conductors

Bobby R. Francis is a Professor and Director of Bands at Texas Christian University. Mr. Francis serves as Conductor of the TCU Wind Symphony, teaches graduate and undergraduate conducting, and is responsible for the supervision of all aspects of the TCU Band and Wind Conducting programs. Mr. Francis is an elected member of the American Bandmasters Association (ABA). He currently serves the organization as President-Elect and will assume the Presidency in February 2024. Previously, Prof. Francis served on the Sousa-ABA- Ostwald Award Selection Committee that selects the outstanding new composition for Wind Band each year – the most significant award a composer for the wind band medium can receive. He also served as a member of the ABA Board of Directors for many years. He is a Past-President of the CBDNA Southwest Region and the Big 12 Band Directors Association. His former directors include Norman White (Junior High), Tom Neugent (High School) and James Keene (College).

Guest conducting appearances include the U.S. Marine Band "President's Own", U.S. Army Band "The Pershing's Own," Frost School of Music – University of Miami Wind Symphony, The U.S. Coast Guard Band, the Lone Star Youth Wind Orchestra among others. The TCU Wind Symphony has performed with guest artists including the Jens Lindemann, Demondrae Thurman, American Brass Quintet, Sam Palafian, Patrick Sheridan, Brian Bowman, Allen Vizzutti, Jon Lewis, Joe Eckert, Corey Mackey, Clay Garrett, Gary Whitman, Jesus Castro- Balbi, Brian West, Shauna Thompson, Markus Theinert and Boston Brass.

In recent years, the TCU Wind Symphony has accepted invitations to perform at the 2018 Convention of the **American Bandmasters Association (ABA)** annual convention with guest artists the "Boston Brass", the 2019 at the **College Band Directors National Association Convention (CBDNA)** in Tempe Arizona with guest artist Demondrae Thurman, the 2020 **Texas Music Educators Association Convention (TMEA)** in San Antonio with guest artist Jens Lindemann and will be hosting and

have accepted an invitation to perform at the **2025 convention of the CBDNA** - at the new TCU Music Center in the Van Cliburn Concert Hall. The TCU Wind Symphony was also invited to perform at the recent convention of the **World Association of Symphonic Winds and Ensembles (WASBE) in Prague, Czech Republic.** The group had to decline due to TCU's covid restrictions for international travel.

He has conducted concerts in the Sydney Opera House, Carnegie Hall, Morton H. Meyerson Symphony Center (Dallas), Bass Performance Hall (Fort Worth), Royal College of Music (London), Lila Cockrell Theater (San Antonio), University of Michigan (Ann Arbor), Tempe Center for the Performing Arts (Tempe, Arizona), Normandy Beach (France), Pearl Harbor (Hawaii) and many locations in Italy, France, Austria, and Germany.

Professor Francis is active as a guest clinician, adjudicator and guest conductor with *recent* engagements including Oregon All-State Band, Texas Community College Directors Association All-State Band, Salem-Keizer Public School District Honor Band, TMEA All-Region Band invitations including Regions 5, 31, 30, 4, 20, 3, 29 and the Arlington (TX) All-city Band. He has recently adjudicated marching band and concert festivals in Mesquite, Denton, Corpus Christi, and Allen. He recently presented a clinic at the Oregon Music Educators Association Conference and has presented many times at Arkansas State University, Lamar University, TMEA and TBA. He will be guest conducting at Auburn University and the University of Kentucky and several all-region bands spring 2023.

As a former member of the Texas All-State Band, Mr. Francis was active as a performer for many years at the beginning of his career. He served as principal clarinetist with the Texas Wind Symphony, was a frequent member of the Dallas Wind Symphony, and was clarinetist with the University of Texas at Arlington Faculty Woodwind Quintet for six years. As a woodwind specialist, Mr. Francis performed as a saxophonist/woodwind with many performing artists including Gladys Knight and the Pips, Bob Crosby, Bobby Short, Johnny Mathis, Red Skelton, John Davidson and others. He was a saxophonist with the Mal Fitch Society Big Band for many years performing at social events, Texas Governors' Inaugural Balls, radio broadcasts, and other government and social events. He was also the founder and clarinetist with "Razzmajazz" - A Dixieland band that performed at Six Flags Over Texas, Great Adventure Amusement Park in New Jersey and many Dallas-area parties, conventions, and social events.

He resides in Colleyville with his wife, Teresa, who is a retired middle school band director, private horn instructor and performance artist. They have two daughters: Tamsyn and Breelyn.

Matthew Garrett is the Director of Athletic Bands at Texas Christian University and Assistant Professor in the TCU School of Music.

He received his Bachelor of Music Education degree from Texas Tech University and his Mater of Music degree in Conducting from TCU. Prior to coming TCU, Matt taught High School in the Texas public school system for fifteen years.

He spent nine years in Mansfield ISD, where most recently he was the Director of Bands at Lake Ridge High School. While in Mansfield, his groups received numerous awards on both the state and national level including the marching band from Lake Ridge HS being named a finalist at the Texas State Marching Band contest in only their second year of existence.

His ensemble responsibilities at TCU include directing the Horned Frog Marching Band, Concert Band, and Basketball Band programs, in addition to assisting with the Wind Ensemble and Symphonic Band. Additionally, Matt is involved in teaching Music Education courses and supervising student teachers. Mr. Garrett is a very active visual designer for marching bands and winter guards. Marching bands using his designs have advanced to the Texas State Marching Contest several times including several finals appearances. Winter Guards using his designs have won state titles and earned finalist status at the WGI World Championships on multiple occasions.

He has been on the instructional staff for the Bluecoats Drum and Bugle Corps and for twelve years was the director and designer for the Ars Nova Winter Guard organization. He also enjoys being a clinician and adjudicator all over the state of Texas.

Mr. Garrett is originally from the Dallas area and is a graduate of Poteet High School band program in Mesquite where he was a student of Scott Coulson. He then attended Texas Tech where he studied music education with Keith Bearden and clarinet with Bob Walzel. After beginning his teaching career, he then attended graduate school at TCU where he was a conducting student of Bobby Francis, studied music education with Brian Youngblood and James McNair and clarinet with Gary Whitman. Mr. Garrett is married to Leslie Garett and they reside in Fort Worth, TX where Matt is a dedicated runner and triathlete.

Emily Keliher is in her first year pursuing a master's degree in wind conducting at Texas Christian University under Mr. Bobby Francis. Keliher received her undergraduate degree at the University of Oklahoma, where she was part of the OU Wind Symphony, Kappa Kappa Psi, and Oklahoma Intercollegiate Band. She was named Flute Studio Member of the Year in 2011.

Before pursuing her master's degree at TCU, Keliher served as the Assistant Band Director at Rockwall-Heath High School, beginning in 2018. Keliher has ten years of experience teaching sixth through twelfth grade and nine years of straight ones on grade one through five music.

Keliher is a member of the Texas Educators Association, Women Band Directors International, a Fort Worth Youth Orchestra guest conductor, and a provisional judge of the Texas Music Adjudicators Association.

Hailing from the great state of Wisconsin, *Heath Bain* studied at the Lawrence University - Conservatory of Music before enlisting as a Musician in the United States Army.

Initially a Horn Player, while at the historic 101st Airborne Division, he quickly found a place leading bands in military ceremonies. In 2021, Bain became the Assistant Conductor of the U.S. Army Band - Japan, conducting outreach and educational concerts alongside Japan's Premier Military Bands. Over his seven-year career, he achieved the rank of Staff Sergeant.

In the spring of 2023, Bain assumed a graduate teaching position at Texas Christian University while pursuing his master's degree in Wind Conducting as a student of Bobby R. Francis.
